BREAKFAST TALK!

Wednesday's breakfast will be focused on leading at the Capitol, legislative issues, and issues for parks. Learn how the East Bay Regional Park District has been a leading advocate for balanced park access.

TUESDAY HIGHLIGHTS:

- Mount Umunhum the long and winding road led to the former Air Force Station, which has been restored to its natural state, revegetated with native plants and opened for the public to enjoy the spectacular views of the valley below. Umunhum means resting place of the hummingbird, and the summit is central to the creation story of our partners the Amah Mutsun Tribal Band. Did you get to see the rattlesnake?
- Bear Creek Redwoods a special sneak preview of this preserve set to open next month. A fierce grassroots battle saved the property from development into luxury homes and a golf course. Many braved the steep trail to the old growth redwoods, and learned about how these forests can help in combating climate change.
- Downtown Los Gatos a great chance to share a meal with new friends and discuss the day's events before climbing aboard the buses for the trip back to Walnut Creek.
- National Park Service Sites got inside the lives of two national figures, conservation advocate and writer John Muir and Nobel Prize-winning playwright Eugene O'Neill. John Muir is considered by many to be "Father of the National Parks." Tour also included an overview of the Juan Bautista de Anza National Historic Trail.
